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1	Preview 	<ul style="list-style-type: none">  Preview title, headings, subheadings, bold face words, pictures and captions, graphs, questions, vocabulary, and first and last paragraphs.  Turn these into questions.  Recall what you know about the subject.
2	Read 	<ul style="list-style-type: none">  Read text carefully to determine meaning and answer questions.  Identify main points.  Summarize text.  Attack unfamiliar words: use context clues; break apart words by prefix, suffix, and root; and/or look for definition in passage or in footnotes.  Connect text to what you already know (to self, to text, to world).
3	Interpret 	<ul style="list-style-type: none">  Understand what you read: use 5 W's-Who, What, When, Where, and Why.  Use some type of notetaking: Thinking Maps, Two-column, Outline, Four-square, Foldables, and/or Interactive Notebooks.  Visualize characters, events, or setting.  Take what you've read with what you know and make an inference or conclusion.
4	Demonstrate 	<ul style="list-style-type: none">  Paraphrase and/or rewrite what you read.  Create illustrations/nonlinguistic representation of what you read.  Retell main points in your own words.  Summarize story elements: use sequence of events, cartoon strips, SWBS-Somebody wanted but so (who or what, plot, conflict, & resolution), etc.
5	Evaluate 	<ul style="list-style-type: none">  Check your understanding.  Answer questions posed by reader, teacher, and text.  Use recovery strategies if necessary: reread text, look for key words, review pictures/charts, and notes.  ENJOY!
